Seasons of Change: Racial Equity and the *Fall* of Prejudices



Dear *{{First Name}}*,

My first remembered experience of racism happened when I was about 8. For a couple of summers, our family hosted a child about my age from the south side of Chicago. His name was Alvin, and he was African American. A part of that time with us was spent at my grandparent's cottage in Michigan, in a very Swedish, very Christian community. I can still picture some of the local kids teasing Alvin and calling him names. I wanted to speak out and stop the teasing, but I remained silent. It wasn't the last time I remained silent in the face of racism.

In spite of my inaction, I was at least aware of racism at age 8. It has taken me much longer to become conscious of the implicit biases I carry that contribute to racism. Defined as 'an unconscious, involuntary prejudice against a thing, person or group,' implicit bias is a little harder to become aware of.

We are a spiritual organization that puts a heavy emphasis on self-awareness and relationships. At our best and in safe space, we help each other become more conscious of what is below the surface of our lives...add to that that our theme for the year is 'Courageous Listening' and I hope that makes it clear why we are hosting this important conversation.

We hope you will join us on Saturday, November 11th, from 2-3pm to explore the phenomenon of "Implicit Bias" with through a Racial Equity lens.

A Brighter Day

As a Racial Equity Advocate, I have made a commitment - to myself and to others- to ask important questions and counter the constructs of racism and stereotypes that may impact the way I show up in the world.

I remember when my Great Grandmother "Nana" died. Sitting in the kitchen with her husband - a man I barely knew - feeling heavy in my chest and being terrified that I might be asked to give him a hug or console him. I observed the patterns of green and yellow on the wallpaper, the plastic covered furniture, and the dark wooden table. I heard the clock ticking like it was my own heart. Raymond, a heavyset white man in a white t-shirt and suspenders, sat at the table with his head in his hands. I remember his wire glasses, his small blue eyes and buzzed hair.

As he spoke with my father, the subject of his life with Nana turned to a violent interaction he had witnessed on the street. How the conversation spun, I have no recollection. I also do not know whether he was an officer, or simply a bystander, but he spoke of a terrible beating between another white man and a black man. He spoke loudly with increasing volume and spewed a feeling that can only be described as hate. He used the worst slurs to describe the man.

I, 10 years old or so, felt frozen. It was only after I found myself dry-heaving outside his house that I realized I had had the strength to move my legs. I was sobbing, frightened, and sick.

I never wanted to hear the "N" word ever again! I have, of course, heard this word and other stories of prejudice and hate again in my life through the news, through history, and through happenstance.

Now, almost 40, I have taken this work seriously by going through certifications on Equitable Leadership, by joining in storytelling and community events in safely held spaces, by working in human services, and by standing up against injustices when I see them. I continue to ask myself not what can I do, but what *will* I do to be anti-racist and pro-equity. To start at home, to be the change we wish to see, to live *agape*.

It is a process. Here is to a brighter day.


